The Primary School Leaving Examination (PSLE) is a criterion referenced examination that is administered to all learners who have completed the Ministry of Education and Skills Development (MoESD) 7-year primary school programme. PSLE candidates sit examinations in seven subjects, namely: Setswana, English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Agriculture and Religious and Moral Education. PSLE results provide feedback across different levels of the education system in terms of the learner's achievement of important knowledge and skills within the primary education programme. This report presents a summary of the 2016 PSLE results. It reports performance at national, district, and city/town council levels and by subject and gender. The report is structured as follows:


- A total of 42517 candidates sat for the 2016 Primary School Leaving Examination. Of this number, 21408(**50.35%**) were females 21109(**49.65%**) were males.
- The candidature decreased from 42553 in 2015 to 42517in 2016, which represents a decrease of 36 (**0.08%**).



The majority of students obtained a Grade C (36.58%) as shown in the pie chart. 22.09% obtained a Grade D while 7.3% obtained Grade E.

Figure 2.2: Comparison of PSLE Overall performance in 2016, 2015, 2014, 2013 and 2012




Performance in the 2016 PSLE results has increased by 1.40%, from 14.65% in 2015 to 16.05% in 2016 for Grade A.

Percentage of candidates obtaining grade B has improved slightly by 0.04%, from 17.84 in 2015 to 17.88% in 2016. Candidates at Grade C declined by 0.67% from 37.25% in 2015 to 36.58% in 2016.

The proportion of candidates at grade D has decreased by 1.18% from 23.27% (2015) to 22.09% (2016). Grade E had an increase of 0.49% from 6.81% (2015) to 7.30% in (2016).


3.0 PERFORMANCE BY DISTRICT AND CITY/TOWN COUNCILS

Figure 3.1: Proportion of Candidates Awarded Grade A to D by District and Town Councils



North East has the highest proportion of Grade A (22.13%) while Ghanzi has the least Grade A (6.08%). Ghanzi has the largest proportion of Grade D (37.43%).

Figure 3.2: Proportion of Candidates Awarded Grades A to C (Pass Grades) in Each District and Town Council




North East District with 82.09% and South East District with 81.88% performed significantly higher than other districts. The least performing district is Ghanzi at 46.08%.


Figure 3.3: Percentage Grade A-C Decline/Improvement From 2015 To 2016




Compared to 2015, the proportion of candidates earning pass grades (A to C) increased in seven (7) districts with exception of Chobe with the greatest decline of 6.56%, followed by Ghanzi with a decline of 3.04% and North East (decline of 2.29%). Jwaneng has the greatest improvement of 9.71%, while South East is at only 0.74% of improvement followed by Lobatse at 4.26% and Southern at 2.73%

4.0 PERFORMANCE BY SUBJECT




- The results show the highest proportion of candidates awarded grade A in English, at 21.78%.
- The lowest proportion of candidates awarded grade A is in Social Studies at 2.66%.
- Setswana has the highest proportion of candidates at grade B with 39.18% compared to other subjects.
- Religious and Moral Education also has the highest proportion of candidates awarded grade C at 40.07% compared to other subjects.
- Science has the highest proportion of candidates awarded grade D at 37.74% when compared to other subjects.
- Agriculture has the highest proportion of candidates awarded grade E with 18.13%.



- Setswana registered the highest A to C grades at 79.50% followed by Mathematics at 66.40%.
- Science has the lowest A to C grades at 50.73%.

Compared to 2015, there has been an improvement in performance in the following subjects: English, Mathematics and Agriculture. Compared to 2015 Agriculture has shown a significant improvement of 6.73%. A decline was noted in Setswana and Moral and Religious Education.

5.0 OVERALL PERFORMANCE BY GENDER





Figure 5.1c: Overall 2015 PSLE by Gender




Figure 5.1d: Overall Performance on the 2016 PSLE by Gender





Figure 5.2: 2016 PSLE Subject Grades A - C by Gender



- Generally, females are performing better than the males across all the four (4) years; 2013, 2014, 2015 and 2016 results as shown in Figure 5.1.
- For the year 2016 at subject level, females outperformed their male counterparts in all subjects.

6.0 SUMMARY OF THE 2016 PSLE RESULTS

- A total of 42517 candidates sat the 2016 PSLE compared to 42553 in 2015 and 42797 in 2014, representing a decrease of 0.08% in candidature between 2016 and 2015, and a decrease of 0.57% in candidature between 2015 and 2014.
- Overall, there is a slight increase of 0.8% in the candidates awarded grades A to C, in 2016 compared to 2015 which is not that significant.
- Agriculture had the most significant improvement at 6.73%.
- Females performed better than males across all subjects.
