2008 JUNIOR CERTIFICATE EXAMINATION RESULTS SUMMARY



INTRODUCTION

The Junior Certificate Examination (JCE) assesses the achievement of learners who have completed the last three years of the 10-year Basic Education Programme. The 10-year basic education curriculum blueprint outlines subject specific learning outcomes and skill areas that cut across all subject areas. The curriculum junior secondary curriculum puts emphasis on understanding and application of concepts; development of inquiry, decision making, reasoning, creative, analytical, problem solving and process skills and the acquisition of hands on experience that should increase the participation and performance of all groups e.g. groups of different abilities, learners with special needs, girls and boys. All these skills entail more practical and challenging content that require higher levels of engagement of a learner's cognitive ability that are commonly referred to as High Order Thinking Skills (HOTS). Examinations are designed to reflect the spirit and emphasis of the curriculum. Thus performance in examinations is indicative of the extent to which the intent of the curriculum is being achieved in schools.

A total of 208 school centres and 45 private centres registered candidates for the 2008 JCE. The 2008 JCE assessed, for the first time, candidates in the 4 junior secondary schools that introduced 'double shift' in 2006. The JCE examination papers were administered from 27 October to 7 November, 2008. Marking of examination scripts started on the 1st of December and was completed on the 17th December.

- The total number of candidates who satisfied the requirements of the 2008 Junior Certificate Examination (JCE) is 38293.
- Out of the **38293** candidates, **36693** were school candidates, while **1536** were from private centres.
- The number of school candidates meeting the requirements of 2008 JCE increased by **354** from last year's figure of **36339**; while the number of private candidates increased by **262** from last year's figure of **1174**.
- These figures show a higher proportionate increase in the number of private candidates compared to school candidates.
- There were **19794** female candidates and **18499** male candidates.
- All the subjects showed an increase in candidature except Design and Technology and Home Economics; Table 1.1 shows a steady decline in candidature for the two subjects since 2006.





- The number of candidates who obtained Merit increased from **9** in 2007 to **69** in 2008.
- Out of the 69 Merits, 12 are from private centres.
- There is a decline in the proportion of Candidates awarded Merit to B, 23.6 in 2008 from 24.6 in 2007 and 27.1 in 2006
- Grades Merit to B represent higher standards of performance and therefore a decline in these grades is likely to be related to a decline in the quality of teaching and learning.
- The number of candidates who obtained Merit to Grade C in 2008 is 28802. This is an increase of 589 from 28213 in 2007
- The overall performance (Merit C) of the 2008 candidates shows a slight improvement of 0.1% Compared to 2007. The amount of change is not significant and therefore overall performance of the 2008 is the same as that of the 2007 candidates.






- Mathematics and Integrated Science has the highest proportion of candidates awarded Grade A at 4.9%
- Setswana has the lowest proportion of candidates awarded Grade A at 0.4%
- Moral Education has the highest proportion of candidates in Grade B with 9.2%
- Setswana Has the Highest proportion of candidates in Grade C with 2.1%
- The average proportion of candidates earning higher grades (A and B) in Core subjects is around 11%

4.0: PERFORMANCE BY TYPE OF CENTRE




5.0: PERFORMANCE BY GENDER



More girls are awarded grades A, B, and C than boys and fewer girls are awarded Grade D than boys






- Females performed better than males in all subjects except Integrated Science.
- The difference is widest in Setswana followed by English and Moral Education.


6.0: PERFORMANCE BY EDUCATION REGION



- The South Central has 78.7%, and Central 78% of their candidates awarded Merit to C. Both Regions performed above the national average of 75.2%.
- The West region has the lowest proportion of Candidates awarded Merit to C.
- The performance of all regions remains fairly constant from 2007 to 2008.



- Central Region has the highest proportion of Candidates awarded Merit and Grade A.
- South Central has the highest proportion of candidates awarded grades Merit to C.



- South Region and North Region show improvement in performance compared to 2007 by 1.7% and 0.4% respectively.
- The other three regions all show a decline in performance.

7.0 SUMMARY OF THE MESSAGE FROM THE 2008 JCE RESULTS

- A total of 38293 candidates sat for the 2008 Junior Certificate Examination compared to 37557 in 2007, an increase of 736 or 2%
- The number of Candidates awarded Merit increased from 9 in 2007 to 69 in 2008.
- There is very little change in the pass rates between 2007 and 2008. The proportion of candidates awarded Merit to C is 75.2% compared to 75.1 in 2007.
- In Core Subjects group, Moral Education has the highest proportion of candidates awarded Grades A to C (27.7%).
- In the General Studies subject group, Religious Education has the highest proportion of candidates awarded Grades A to C (28.5%).
- In the Practical Studies subject group, Commerce & Bookkeeping/Accounting has the highest proportion of candidates awarded Grades A to C (29.5%)
- A small proportion of Candidates were awarded Merit to Grade B, (23.6%). This may be an indication of generally low standards of performance nationally. It may also be an indication of low quality of learning and teaching at the junior secondary level. The average proportion of candidates earning higher grades (A and B) in Core subjects is also very low, around 11%. Overall grades Merit to B and A and B at subject level represent higher standards of performance; therefore, small proportions of candidates earning these grades and a decline in these proportions may be related to among other factors, a low and declining quality of teaching and learning in schools.





- Montsamaisa and Bokamoso had a significant increase in candidature. There was no change in Candidature in Rakops. Itekeng has a drop in candidature in Itekeng from 267 in 2007 to 248 in Itekeng.
- It is important to note that a decline or improvement in student performance is attributable to numerous factors in the school environment, student and home factors. School factors will include availability of teachers, classrooms, teaching time, teacher student ratio, etc. Therefore a change in school enrolment alone will not explain a change in student performance.







- Centre results have improved at Grade B and Grade D. A reduction of Candidate awarded Grade D is an improvement.
- The results show no negative impact on student performance as a result of an increase in candidature.





